THE FAMILY OF DONALD ROSS

In Kincardine in 1828, the year we believe Donald Ross to have been born, according to his death certificate, three Ross children named Donald were born. We can only go on probability in trying to determine which is our Donald. The Scots have a traditional 'naming pattern', as did the Irish. The first son was named for his father's father, the first daughter for the mother's mother, and so on, zig zagging down. Look at the children of Donald and Johanna. The first child, a girl, Christina, named for Johanna's mother, Christian, followed by Catherine, named for Catherine McLeod, Donald's mother. The first and only boy, Thomas, for Donald's father, the fourth girl Johanna, for Johanna herself, and the fifth child, Alexandrina, presumably named for Johanna's father Alexander, in case no more boys arrived. You will see the name Alexander carrying down the family in later generations. I think it is reasonable to assume that of the three pairs of available Ross parents in Kincardine in 1828, this pair fits pretty well.

From the Parish records of 1841 we find the family of Thomas Ross, aged 45, farmer, living at Crockner, Longland, parish of Kincardine, with his wife Catharine, 40, Bassy, 19, Alexander (IGI has Ann, these things happen), Donald, 12, Mary, 10, John, 7, Margaret, 5, and William, 1. Good enough, I would say.

Johanna was born at Knockarthur in the parish of Rogart, the fifth of six children born to Alexander and Chrictian Sutherland. Knockarthur is a bleak, windswept hillside outside the township of Rogart, which itself is in the hills inland from the east coast of the Scottish Highlands, north west of Golspie, well to the north of Inverness. To the east is the north sea, to the north John O' Groats. On the hillside are the remains of about a dozen crofts, each 5 acres or less, divided up by dry stone walls. The ruins of two roomed stone cottages stand on several still. By the time the youngest child of the family, Alexander, was born, his father had died. It is hard to see how Christian could have brought up six children under 13 alone on the croft. Maybe at this time she moved down to Golspie in search of employment. Johanna and Donald were married in July 1853, at the Parish church in Golspie, just near to Dunrobin Castle, the seat of the Dukes of Sutherland, which was being rebuilt at this time. We wonder if Donald could have been involved as a stonemason on this job.

We understand that he was involved here as a stonemason on the Bulla bridge and the Presbyterian Church. Note that Johanna's mother's name, Christian, becomes Christina in the next two generations. Christian is a commonly occurring name for a woman in Highland Scotland in these times.

KINCARDINE

In 1846 the Parish of Kincardine held 2000 inhabitants.

The church was built in 1799, and seated 650.

In the graveyard are many ROSSES.






The word KNOCK means 'hill' - presumably Arthur's Hill.

Knockarthur is an outlying settlement of the Parish of Rogart, which at one time numbered 1500 inhabitants.

In Johanna's time, the principal language spoken was the Gaelic, though by 1846 it was giving way to English.





ROGART

We believe that this is the church where Johanna Sutherland would have been Christened.

It was built in 1777, with a manse nearby.



GOLSPIE

In 1846 there were 491 people in the village of Golspie.

The church was built in 1738, and enlarged in 1751. It seated 565 people.

Golspie is the seat of the Dukes of Sutherland, Dunrobin Castle is about a mile from the church, right at the sea shore.
